Past: Everything old is new again

On October 10, Slade moderated the “Pacific Energy Summit: The U.S. Energy Revolution and the Asia-Pacific’s Energy and Environmental Challenge.” The Summit, by the National Bureau of Asian Research (NBR), served as a platform for a strategic conversation is on how to maximize the benefits for the Asia-Pacific of the new energy era and strengthen leadership across the region to make progress toward a cleaner energy future.

This year NBR released an update to its [Report of the Commission on the Theft of American Intellectual Property](#), on which Slade served as Commissioner. The report has continued to generate interest in Congress and the Administration. Here’s what Slade said upon its release: “The theft of American intellectual property by Chinese state-backed hackers continues unabated despite promises to the contrary. The costs to the U.S. economy remain the range of \$200–600 billion dollars.”

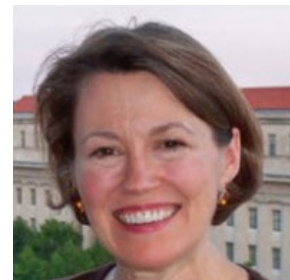
