



JOHN M. SHALIKASHVILI CHAIR IN NATIONAL SECURITY STUDIES

Bringing a wealth of military experience to bear on critical issues in the Asia-Pacific

Highlights include:

- A dozen meetings with leaders on Capitol Hill, including providing special support to Senator Angus King on the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea
- A public conference addressing challenges in the maritime commons with the United States vice chief of naval operations and the chiefs of navy from Australia, Brazil, and Japan
- Keynote address by the incumbent Shali Chair, Admiral Jonathan W. Greenert, at the 25th anniversary of the PLA Conference at the Army War College
- An inaugural trip by Admiral Greenert to South Korea, Japan, and U.S. Command (PACOM) to meet with senior defense leaders including PACOM Commander Admiral Harry B. Harris Jr.

Admiral Jonathan W. Greenert served as the 30th U.S. Chief of Naval Operations from 2011 to 2015. Prior assignments include Vice Chief of Naval Operations; Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command (Atlantic Fleet); and Commander, U.S. 7th Fleet (Indo-Asia-Pacific). Admiral Greenert is a career nuclear submarine officer and a 1975 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy (BS, Ocean Engineering).
